





6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Govt. College for Women Parade Jammu envisions to be metamorphosed from institution of learning to centre of knowledge by attaining excellence in all the areas of life.

Since the institution is a Govt. College therefore, there is no management system.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The institutions focus on multi skill developments of students in order to ensure employability. Since GCW Parade is an autonomous college under university of Jammu, Jammu with academic autonomy, therefore, its curriculum is designed by members of board of studies comprising of faculty of college and some external members form universities and industry etc. This year board of studies in different subjects was held in the month of April for Vth and Vlth Semester along with its discussed about the implementation of choice based credit system in different subject.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning process is through traditional method of teaching i.e chalk and talk methods, group discussions, quiz, debate, viva etc. Project works are also given to the student.

Inquiry based learning if facilitated through community survey (NSS), Industrial visit and field work.

ICT facilities by using internet, computer audio video aids etc. In Functional English BCA, Home Science, Bio-Technology and Electronics.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

From session 2014-15 semester system has been adopted in which 20% of the total marks is given to the student through internal assessment and 80% through external examination. As autonomous college, our college has own examination cell in which there is RR, Secrecy and conduct wing from Semester 1st which is fully computerised from registration upto result. Results are uploaded in the website of the college. Marks Sheet is issued by the college whereas Degree will be provided to the student by the university. Evaluation of the Answer Sheet and Award Rolls are completed in the Evaluation Centre of the College whereas result is complied through Private Agency outside the state.

6.3.4 Research and Development

There are two Major Research Projects sponsored by DST/UGC are in operation at present. Besides that paper are presented in national & international conferences and teacher are pursuing Ph.D through part time.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Well equipped Library for Humanities and science having 69,000 books. Automated and digitized library with ICT facilities, E-magic studios (7), projector (5) 3D LED TV beside number of computers, genset 50 KV, KYAN interactive studios.

Main objective of colleges to develop human resource for country in particular and the world as a whole. Our college has its own placement cell which carried out placement drives from time to time. This year no of students are placed in different companies and Banks through Udaan Schemes.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Institution is a Govt. institution all the Gazetted faculty is recruited through JKPSC and Non- Gazetted staff is recruited through J&K SSRB.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Our students of B.A/B.Sc/B.Com & BCA Part III visit to industrial area, such visit provide training platform for young future scientist and provide a pioneering field that complements the mission of higher education. This year our students visited, SIDCO SAMBA and pharmaceutical company. Beside that Medical Students also visited Fisheries Department, Sericulture Department in order to get awareness about the technique of fish culturing and production of silk. Student of PG Semester-IIIrd of Home Science conducted skill based training for the women where they were thought "Tie and Dye" and "Papad Making". PG Student of Home Science also visited village Jagati for building rapport with women of the village to analyse the situation.


