Education institutions continually upgrade their infrastructure, expand outreach in terms of diversity of courses and modify the pedagogy to suit the requirements of the students in particular and the society at large. Conferment of autonomy to our institution has facilitated the college to evaluate its advantages and shortfalls through in-house analysis of the feedbacks received from various stakeholders like students, parents, alumnae etc. These feedbacks are obtained in the form of suggestions or through feedback forms devised by IQAC. The college is presently working on devising a robust mechanism of obtaining the feedback from various stakeholders in a structured manner to assess the best practices and the shortcomings of the institution. The focus is to formulate a procedure to periodically review the performance of the various aspects of the teaching learning pursuits of the college based on the satisfaction level of the students as indicated in their feed backs. These inputs so obtained through the feedbacks form the basis for initiating measures for progression of the institution. Presently the college has adopted a two pronged strategy to get the feedbacks 1. Top down strategy 2. Bottom up strategy 1. Top down strategy: - The functioning of the College is regulated by different bodies which include "Board of Studies" of different subjects, "Academic Council", "Governing Body", University of Jammu and Department of Higher Education Govt. of Jammu and Kashmir. Formal and informal discussions with the members of these bodies regarding the curricular revision / enrichment, augmentation of the infrastructure, diversity of courses, introduction of courses focused on employability and other relevant inputs facilitate the College to strategize and prioritize the developmental advances for the benefit of the students. 2. Bottom up Strategy:- the feedback inputs are received from the students , Parents, Alumnae, Corporate houses (end users). Students are asked to submit their assessment of the functioning of the College in terms of the completion of the course content, availability of the sufficient facilities for extracurricular activities, and other relevant infrastructure. Suggestions are sought from parents and alumnae in the meetings organized for the purpose about their expectations from the College and the level of satisfaction they draw from the present state of affairs. Suggestions are also sought from the members of corporate sector who are included in the various boards of studies of different subjects about the demands of the employment market and the initiatives the College has to take to enhance the employability of the students aspiring to enter the job market after graduation. The suggestions and the feedbacks are thoroughly analyzed by a team of senior faculty and IQAC. Proposals for continuance of the best practices of the College and improvements in the areas which have been red flagged in the different feedbacks received from the stakeholders are framed and submitted to the Principal for consideration and approval there after.

Library functions on an open access system for the faculty and students. Issuance registers are maintained on daily basis and library staff ensures that books issued are returned within fifteen days. Sports are integral to the academic calendar of the college, aimed to help students to improve their physical fitness, mental toughness and leadership qualities. Sports activities are coordinated by a qualified physical instructor, assisted by a team of support staff. Further, that a sports committee comprising of faculty and student representatives is constituted to suggest improvements in the overall sports scenario of the college. The committee also recommends the purchase of new sports equipment, sports kits and measures to be initiated to maintain and develop sports facilities for the overall growth of sports culture in the College. Students with potential for excellence are publicly felicitated supported financially to the extent permissible under rules. Gymnasium with a good stock of equipments is maintained and upgraded by sports department under the advisory role of sports committee and the Principal. Maintenance of IT equipments and their periodic up gradation is recommended by IT technical committee of the College. Thorough review of the furniture and accessories available in the classrooms is conducted at end of each academic session. Replacements / repairs of desks and face lifting of class rooms are carried out periodically. Plumber electrician appointed by the college maintain

uninterrupted water supply and electricity respectively. Hostel warden, matron and other support staff take care of the hostellers. Medical dispensary is operated by medical assistant in the campus. Other items like, Xerox machines, water purifier and drinking water cooler, fridges etc. are serviced /repaired on regular basis. In general all required efforts are put to maintain the physical infrastructure and optimize its utilization for the benefit of the students and other stakeholders.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

Decentralization of the functioning is inherent to government institutions. The College being a Govt. institution with academic autonomy is managed through a well coordinated hierarchical management system. Starting with the students as the base unit and progressively placing teachers, principal, boards of studies, academic council, and governing body as subsequent higher units, all work in unison within their specific roles in the overall functioning of the

institution. The students and the teachers being the two pivotal functional units of the college are included in framing the various policy proposals and the management of the developmental affairs as well. Principal, in consultation with the senior faculty, frames many committees of teachers, ministerial staff, representatives of the students, representatives of the alumnae and other stake holders to supervise the functioning of the routine affairs of the college and propose long term developmental / academic initiatives for the overall growth as envisioned in the vision of the institution. The College functions in the

true spirit of participative management as almost all functional and developmental issues are dealt through these committees. Ever since autonomy has been conferred, the college through the active participation of the faculty and the administrative staff has managed the conduct all examinations (internal and external), evaluation of answer scripts and compilation of the awards much

to the satisfaction of the students and other stakeholders. Heads of the departments, the examination committee and faculty work in tandem to chart out the details of the different examinations much in advance. The heads of the departments get the question papers set by the panel of paper setters, approved

by the boards of studies of different subjects. The question papers are moderated by experienced teachers from outside the College. The date sheets for each examination are framed by the examination committee after taking inputs from the representatives of the students. All supervisory staff is appointed by the principal in consultation with the examination committee. In fact all the aspects of the examinations conducted in the college are carried out by active participation of the faculty students and the principal. Besides teaching, the faculty plays a crucial role in decision making through their representation in the Governing body, Academic Council, Board of studies, IQAC and advisory committees. In addition to this the faculty as the members and conveners of different committees like admission, purchase, development, discipline, scholarship /student welfare etc. constituted at the beginning of each academic year function effectively in running the affairs of the college. CONTEXT: College in its more than seventy years of existence has perpetually pursued the approach of society transformation by empowering women through education. In achieving this goal a multidimensional approach aimed at increasing the knowledge quotient, grooming the personalities, imparting employable skills, honing leadership qualities etc. of the students has been the endeavor of the college. The college has provided all necessary infrastructure , resource material and guidance to the students for attainment of this vision. PRACTICE: The practices aimed at achieving the cherished goal of empowering women thereby transforming the society are continually evolving and the college tries to follow all the contemporary methodologies and technologies in a bid to keep pace with the demands of the society in general and address to the interest and expectations of the students in particular. Besides the usual events planned at the beginning of the academic session as depicted in the annual academic calendar the college organized the following events to achieve the anticipated goal. 1. Organized information communication technology based workshop aimed at acquainting the students and teachers about the advances in this field. The students have demonstrated their prowess in cultural and sports activities year after year in all competitive events organised at the University or at state levels. The students have brought laurels to the College and the state of Jammu and Kashmir by participating in the Republic day parades and other cultural events organized

in the national and state capitals. The students have always been in the fore front in social activities like cleanliness drives, blood donation camps etc. In fact, the College being pioneer in the state of Jammu and Kashmir in the field of higher education for girls has aptly empowered the women of this region in all conceivable arrears of influence. PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED RESOURCES REQUIRED: The College being centrally located in the heart of the city experiences land constraints in its efforts to diversify and provide additional facilities to the students. Mobilization of funds for upgradation of infrastructure and diversification of programmes offered in college is always a concern. II. Making Campus Eco Friendly GOALS ENVISAGE: • To conserve Energy o Use of renewable energy o Efforts for Carbon neutrality o Plantation o Hazardous waste management o E-waste management CONTEXT: The institution lay stress on Eco Friendly Environment. It creates awareness among students, teaching and non teaching staff about its significance. PRACTICE: Energy conservation: Maximum Use of natural light and ventilation to avoid day time use of electricity for lighting. Florescent bulbs replaced with Compact Fluorescent Light bulbs. Seminar halls fitted with energy efficient electric appliances. Students and faculty are conscious to switch off the electrical and electronic devices of the classes when not in use. Efforts for carbon neutrality: Waste collected every day , degradable waste buried near trees and in a pit in one corner of the college so that it becomes manure for the trees and other vegetation. Non degradable waste is regularly collected by local agencies for recycling. Polythene bags are banned in the college. Botanical garden of college is loaded with green foliage, well maintained with flowering plants and crotons. Burning of waste is strictly prohibited in the college. Plantation: NSS volunteers and NCC cadets plant trees in the campus. Botany department and EVS department conducted a plantation drive in which the staff and students participated Cleanliness of the campus: Regular cleaning of campus is done by the 10 sweepers appointed by the college. The NCC, Volunteers ,teachers also undertake cleanliness drive. E-waste management: The college adopted digital mode partially for documentation in a bid to reduce the use of paper in official work. Duplex printing Technique is encouraged.e-waste bins are available in college for its collection and proper disposal. The students and staff is encouraged to use these bins. Awareness Programmes: Awareness programmes on global warming are conducted - Ozone depletion and environment related issues are highlighted. A lecture on Vermicomposting, was organized by Botany department., Students of of the department visited SIDCO Industrial complex to study Solid waste Management, organized workshop on Wild Edible Plants, A workshop on Mushroom Cultivation was organized in collaboration with SKUAST. College conducted, environment awareness activities - World Earth Day organized by EVS Department .Plant saplings were planted at various places inside the college premises. Educational trip to Salal Hydro-Electric Power Station was organized by Geography and Physics department to show geographical consideration and working of the hydroelectric power station. Seminar on Green Environment including Green Chemistry, Green Energy, Green Computing, etc. organized by science club of the college under the aegis of Indian Science Congress Association, Jammu chapter to create awareness of growing problem of pollution and introduction to green alternatives for minimizing the damaging effects of pollution. PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED RESOURCES REQUIRED: The college has space constraints as such outdoor sports facilitates are not adequately available. Space for expansion of botanical garden is not available as such we have a small garden with rich diversity of plant species planted in a congested manner. The college plans to increase the number of class rooms for which the process has already commenced. An auditorium with all modern facilities and seating capacity of about a thousand students is required to give a boost to the student centric activities.

The vision of establishing a Women College by Maharani Tara Devi got fructified in the establishment of a women college initially by the name Maharani Mahila College and later under the name Govt. College for Women Parade Ground Jammu in the year 1944 and 1953 respectively. The objective was to disseminate education among the women residing in Jammu and other far-flung areas of the state. 8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

College realizes, that the requirements and expectations of students vary with every passing academic year and to be in sync with the expectations of the students a well thought out future plan of action is prepared each year. The future plan is formulated with the aim that all facets of education are progressively improved upon, so that the students feel more confident to face the world after leaving the campus. The future plan for the academic year 2018-19 is broadly divided into following achievable goals. 1. Curricular aspects. The Colleges plans to introduce courses focused on imparting employable skills to the students. The revision of the curriculum shall be aimed at incorporating field work and project work as an essential component of the courses offered in the college. Introduction of more PG programmes and UG courses together with certain value added courses shall be undertaken. Examination /evaluation strategies shall be improvised so that the results are declared in time. Every care shall be taken to minimize the grievances of students with regard to evaluation. 2. Extracurricular aspects. Extension lectures, seminars and workshops shall be organized for the benefit of students and faculty. MOUs shall be signed with different Government and non-government organizations with the sole aim of providing employable skills to the students. Teachers shall be encouraged to attend refresher courses, seminars, conferences to increase their professional competence. Further the teachers shall be encouraged to submit research projects to different funding agencies and cultivate a integrated research ambience within the campus. 3. Infrastructure: - Reading room facility shall be created for the students by erecting a prefabricated structure over the top of the library building. Renovation of the hostel shall be undertaken. Library shall be enriched with books and journals and the process of automation of the library shall be expedited. 4. The College is due for NAAC accreditation cycle III, all necessary preparations shall be under taken.
